Not only is it possible, but for some people it may make more sense than renting a car, especially if you focus on your sightseeing in some specific areas, or if driving in an unfamiliar city can be stressful for you. You'll be pleased to know that you'll see many of L.A.'s top attractions on a Metro Red Line tour of Los Angeles. The L.A. subway and over-the-ground train system are within walking distance of many attractions. L.A. Tourism also has car-free itineraries in certain areas and several resources to follow specific themes. It is important to be close to the sights and public transport. Consider staying in Hollywood. Hollywood and its surroundings, for example, have a lot to offer from hollywood hotels without too much problems. In Hollywood, downtown L.A. and Universal Studios Hollywood are easily accessible via the L.A. Metro Red Line, the only high-speed transportation in town. Getting from Hollywood to Santa Monica or Disneyland with public transport options is very time consuming, but not impossible. There are many routes that require only one transfer. Staying in downtown L.A. is optional. That isLess touristy and less glamorous than Hollywood, but there's plenty to do, a straight shot to Hollywood or Universal Studios Hollywood, and an easy connection to Disneyland via Metrolink, Amtrak, or the 460 Disneyland Express bus. It's also easier and faster to get from Hollywood to Santa Monica from more downtown. It's not really close, it's more direct. Consider staying near the Music Center. Live theaters and music, museums, Chinatown nightlife, El Pueblo de Los Angeles historic sites and trendy bars are within easy walking walk. From Civic Center or Union Station, you can get to Hollywood in 16-20 minutes via the Metro Red Line. If you're used to walking around big cities like New York and Berlin, downtown L.A. is very walkable, even if there's more than one interesting thing between points of interest. If you're attending staples center, Nokia Theater, or L.A. Convention Center events, you'll want to stay around L.A.Live, an entertainment complex in downtown Los Angeles' South Park neighborhood adjacent to Staples Center and the Los Angeles Convention Center. You can also stay in a hotel near LAX Airport and create that hub. Then, take the daily airport flyaway shuttle from LAX to and from Santa Monica, Hollywood, and downtown L.A. to explore. Although not geographically logical (Hollywood is closer to Santa Monica than LAX), the directness and economy of taking a flyaway makes it a more efficient hub. If you're the kind of person who's done for the day by 8pm, this might be a reasonable option for you. But in fact, it's more fun to stay where something is going on in the evening. Consider a stay in Santa Monica or Venice Beach. If you spend a day or two in Santa Monica or Venice Beach, it's easy to get around by bus. If you just go to the beach from your hotel, you can probably walk. Most of the hotels and hostels are relatively close to the beach, but there are a few things inland. Staying at Disneyland is useful if that is the main reason for your visit. There are dozens of local bus services and Metrolink inter-city commuter transit constitutes a difference between small cities and cities. Many of these are integrated into Google Maps and Bing Maps, so you can map public transport routes from point A to point B. However, neither includes all options and both may offer strange routes. One of the reasons we recommend staying in Hollywood if you don't have a car is that Hollywood can be very walkable. Another reason is one area between Hollywood, Universal Studios and Downtown L.A., where faster Metrorail is actually the only area that runs underground. So it's easy to stay in one of these areas and visit the other two via metro. If you're staying in Hollywood, it's near metro stations (Hollywood and the Highlands or Hollywood and Vine) and can be reached in about 15-20 minutes at Universal Studios or downtown L.A. This common area has dozens of attractions within reach of the Metro Red Line, so you can easily get around these areas between walking

and public transport. Taking the Expo Line to the beaches of Santa Monica will make it easy to quickly travel from the Red Line to the museums and gardens of Exposition Park near the University of Southern California. The beach is a 76-90 minute tube ride from Hollywood and the Highlands. You can also visit attractions in Long Beach or Pasadena with transfers to the Blue or Gold Lines, but like the Expo Line, it takes much longer to get there because the trains run on the ground and are much farther away. Bus take you from Hollywood and downtown L.A. to Santa Monica is an option to visit the beach. From downtown L.A., Santa Monica's Big Blue Bus Rapid 10 is the fastest route to the Santa Monica Pier. It takes 45 minutes to an hour and a half, depending on the time, and usually averages more than an hour. From Hollywood, you can plan your trip for speed and scenery. For the scenery, Metrobus 2 will take you through West Hollywood and Beverly Hills along the Sunset Strip to UCLA where you can transfer to the Santa Monica Big Blue Bus. We don't go to the Getty Center, Getty Villas or Disneyland, but the five narrated tour routes stop at 99 other potential stops, some of which provide access to multiple attractions. All stops are close to at least one tourist attraction. Tickets can be purchased in 24, 48 and 72 hours, unlimited rides on five routes, and connectors to LAX. Hop-on hop-off tickets offer discounts on many L.A. attractions, as well as 10% off other Starline tours, including movie stars Holmes Tours and Haunted Hollywood Tours. You can also use the hop-on hop-off tour as an option to get to Santa Monica from Hollywood or downtown L.A., and explore other L.A. attractions along the way. The downside when relocating from a Hollywood hotel to a Santa Monica hotel is that you have luggage. Another drawback is that tour buses don't run in the evening, so you'll want to plan your daily tour loop so that the last stop is near your hotel or a place where you can easily return to your hotel for alternative transportation. Depending on traffic conditions, it can take any more than an hour and a half to two hours. If you're staying until Disneyland closes at midnight on a summer weekend night, the last 460 bus to downtown L.A. goes to Hollywood by subway around 2:30 a.m. Another option is to take the Metro Red Line to Union Station, take a Metrolink (commuter train) or Amtrak train to Fullerton Station, and take the Anaheim ART bus to Disneyland for one stop. This results in two transfers instead of one, which takes the same time or longer. It's more efficient to book a Disneyland ticket and include transportation from your L.A. hotel. One drawback to this is that if you're planning a return stay at an L.A. hotel, you'll have limited time to stay at Disneyland. The other is that it's not necessarily faster than the public transport option, as you may be stopped at many hotels, but you'll need less planning. Another option is to plan your Disney trip for a day or two at the end of your stay and spend the last night or two near Disneyland. You can get Disneyland tickets with transportation from brokers like Viator, which are much cheaper than one-way taxi fares, but don't use returns. Check in to your Disneyland area hotel instead. That way, you can stay in the park until it closes. If Disneyland is your first stop, there are plenty of ways to get there from Los Angeles International Airport without a car.
